Dark Spectacle (Abrostola triplasia) NFG	1	Macro	Resident. Larvae feed on stinging nettle.
Diamond-back Moth (Plutella xylostella) NFG	2	Micro	A resident and immigrant species. Larvae feed on turnips, cabbages and allied plants including sea kale. Also associated with

Dingy Dowd (Blastobasis adustella) NFG	1	Micro	Resident. Larvae have been found to feed on fresh, decaying or dried vegetable matter.

Silver Y (Autographa gamma)	4	Macro	An annual immigrant and episodic resident. The moth usually appears from July to September but large numbers of immigrants can be seen at any time between mid May and early November. The larvae feed on a wide variety of plants.

Swallow Prominent (Pheosia tremula)	6	Macro	A resident occurring singly or sparingly in a wide range of habitats. Probably generally distributed. Double-brooded, flying mainly from late April to mid June and again from late July to early September. The larvae feed on sallow, poplar and aspen.
Tawny-barred Angle (Macaria liturata) NFG	1	Macro	Resident occasionally common on heaths and evergreen plantations. Larva feed on Scots pine.

White Ermine (Spilosoma lubricipeda)	4	Macro	A resident and occasional immigrant. Previously single-brooded, flying from late April to mid July but, incresasingly, from mid August to late September. Larvae feed on ivy flowers, dock, plantain, bindweed, hop, goosefoot and bedstraw
White-spotted Pug (Eupithecia tripunctaria)	1	Macro	Resident. Larvae feed on the flowers of hogweed, angelica and wild parsnip.
Willow Beauty (Peribatodes rhomboidaria)	5	Macro	Redsident. Larvae feed on privet, lilac, ivy, honeysuckle, hawthorn, dock, heather and gorse.
