Common Quaker (Orthosia cerasi)	35	Macro	Very Common (9,110)	A very common, resident species found in a wide range of habitats. Single-brooded, flying mainly from early February to late May. Larvae feed on birch, sallow, oaks, lime, elm, bramble, rose, sweet chestnut, hawthorn and ash.
Early Grey (Xylocampa areola)	4	Macro	Common (6,249)	A common resident species found in a wide range of habitats. Primarily flies from late February to mid May. Larvae feed on honeysuckle.

Small Quaker (Orthosia cruda)	47	Macro	Common (4,821)	A common species associated with deciduous woods. Single-brooded, flying from mid-February to late April. Larvae feed on oak, silver birch, sallow, lime and rose.
Streamer (Anticlea derivata) NFY	1	Macro	Fairly Common (925)	A fairly common, resident species. Single-brooded, flying mainly from mid-April to late May. Larvae feed on wild rose.
Swallow Prominent (Pheosia tremula) NFY	1	Macro	Common (4,210)	A resident occurring singly or sparingly in a wide range of habitats. Probably generally distributed. Double-brooded, flying mainly from late April to mid June and again from late July to early September. The larvae feed on sallow, poplar and aspen.
Tufted Button (Acleris cristana) NFY NFG	1	Micro	Scarce (258)	Resident. Larvae feed on the flowers and fruit of pear, hawthorn, sloe and apple.

Twin-spotted Quaker (Anorthoa munda)	2	Macro	Common (1,766)	A fairly common, resident species. Single-brooded, flying mainly from early March to late April. Larvae feed on oak, aspen, sallow, hop and damson.

Notable Records

Species	Comment
Lead-coloured Drab (Orthosia populeti)	A relatively scarce or rare species within Sussex; Likely to be only the 2nd time recorded in Plumpton & East Chiltington.
Tufted Button (Acleris cristana)	A relatively scarce or rare species within Sussex; First time recorded at this location.
Red-letter Flat-body (Agonopterix ocellana)	A relatively scarce or rare species within Sussex; First time recorded at this location.
Purple Thorn (Selenia tetralunaria)	First time recorded at this location.
Brindled Beauty (Lycia hirtaria)	5 is now the highest number recorded during a single survey at this location. The previous highest count was 4.
Brindled Pug (Eupithecia abbreviata)	5 is now the highest number recorded during a single survey at this location. The previous highest count was 2.

Species	Comment
Twenty-plume Moth (Alucita hexadactyla)	8 is now the highest number recorded during a single survey at this location. The previous highest count was 1.; Only the 4th time recorded at this location.
Parsnip Moth (Depressaria radiella)	Only the 6th time recorded at this location.
Foxglove Pug (Eupithecia pulchellata)	Only the 5th time recorded at this location.
Streamer (Anticlea derivata)	Only the 2nd time recorded at this location.
